THE CHAPS FROM THE OVAL

If the Kent rivalry with Essex is keenly mutual and most certainly reciprocated, the one with Surrey has often been more nuanced. To be honest growing up watching Kent in the 1980s it was Middlesex who were often the villains of the piece from the 'Big Smoke'. Surrey? Well, we tended to beat them, they were harmless...

That changed in the mid 1990's, they got good and they also got rich and were often perceived as 'arrogant'. The Oval was gradually refurbished and the Test coffers were filled. The Hollioake brothers (Ben and Adam) led the charge as they reinvented themselves as a cricketing powerhouse. As the poorer country cousins, the rivalry began to develop between us and we took great delight in beating them when we did. Sadly, their new golden age ('96-'03) was partly kick-started at Lord's when they thrashed us in the 1997 B&H Cup Final at Lord's by eight wickets. A sobering day where Kent could only muster 214-9 off their 50 overs thanks in part to Mark Ealham's defiant 52. The Oval mob romped to victory with five overs to spare, Ben Hollioake making 98 and Alec Stewart 75*. It was official, I no longer had a soft spot for them!

Curiously though for all their international stars and big bucks, Kent have enjoyed plenty of remarkable moments against the "Brown Caps" often in from of a 20,000 crowd and a partially inebriated Oval. We might moan about the Friday night office drinkers and beer snakes at the T20, but it is the Oval where I have been part of the biggest crowds I have ever seen Kent win in front of. It can be rather like Christians venturing into the Lion's Den but often up to a fifth of the crowd appear to be up from the Garden of England and we love to let them know it when we're winning!

In 2014 we beat them in the T20 by 21 runs, Stevens the star with a 38 ball 67 including 7x 6s. In 2015 we thrashed them at the Oval, a certain Mr. Stevens making 90 off 39 balls and then taking 4-39! Oh boy did we enjoy that night! In 2017 we won a classic, set 206 to win Kent managed it by eight wickets with

three balls to spare, Joe Denly eviscerating them with 116 off 63 balls. Another bonkers night for the legion of delirious Kent fans.

In 2018 Kent won another classic, this time by six runs. Kent posted 173-6 (Denly 102) and then Joe took a remarkable hat-trick as Surrey crumbled from 98-1 off 8.2 overs to 167 all out with seven balls to spare. We haven't always come out on top in the thrillers though. In the 50-over One-Day Cup QF at the Oval in 2015 Surrey made 273 (Roy 112) and Kent were on the brink at 101-7 and 169-9 but Matt Coles launched into a oneman mission to save the day adding 67 for the final wicket (Matt Hunn 1*) and making a stunning 100 before we fell short by 17. The best individual knock I have seen vs Surrey.

The thing about Surrey though is going to the Oval is really rather pleasant. A huge contrast with the stuffy and exclusive Lord's where unless you're wearing and egg and bacon tie and went to the "right" public school you feel excluded like a second-class citizen. By contrast for Championship and 50 -vers games Kent Members are welcome in the historic pavilion at the Oval to enjoy the facilities and peruse all the historical memorabilia.

I also have to add that my favourite ever Kent game at Canterbury features a sensational win over Surrey in the B&H Cup semi-final in 1992. The St Lawrence was heaving with over 10,000, the atmosphere febrile. Surrey made 198 all out (Thorpe 82). The brilliant Kent side of that era, (Hooper, Fleming & Ealham etc) then looked like they'd messed up the chase once Hooper had gone for 50. In a classic nerve-wracking finale Kent snuck through to another Lord's Final by two wickets with a ball to spare. The place went mental. The highlights are on YouTube, well worth a look. So I can't really hate them? Of course, the current Surrey squad is packed with proper pantomime villains, the Curran brothers, Rikki Clarke and the perpetually grumpy Gareth Batty(!), but unlike the Essex rivalry, it is more tongue in cheek, more jovial, more fun. But we still do love to beat them!

THE 'OLDEST RIVALRY'



On 27 June 1709 a cricket match was played at Dartford Brent between teams representing Kent and Surrey. It's generally recognised as the first "intercounty match" ever played in our sport.

Thus began the oldest rivalry in county cricket, one that epitomises the game and what it means to the supporters of neighbouring counties. In the 300 years since that first encounter, there have been well over 300 matches played.

On 19 July 1776 at Carshalton a match between the two sides ended abruptly owing to a dispute "about one of the players being catched out, when Surrey was 50 a-head in the first innings; from words they came to blows".

Kent were also the first county side to face Surrey at The Oval in 1846. Championship meetings between the two sides in both 1906 and 1970 were decisive in Kent winning the County Championship, with the visitors celebrating a league title at the home of their rivals.

Since the advent of T20 cricket in 2003, Kent and Surrey have played each other 35 times, with Kent winning 16, Surrey 18 and one no result.

Kent's current highest recorded T20 total against Surrey was 231/7 at The Oval in 2015, with Darren Stevens scoring 90 from just 39 balls. Kent won that match by 54 runs, with four wickets from Stevens in the second innings.

Surrey also recorded the second-lowest team total for any team facing Kent in T20s in 2012, again at The Oval, when the 'Brown Caps' were dismissed for 88 chasing Kent's total of 136/8, Azhar Mahmood taking 3-12 for the Spitfires.




